Origins: Tough Questions, Real Answers

Texts: Genesis 4:1-7; Hebrews 11:4

God doesn't need your money, but He does want your heart. Money is tightly connected to what is in our hearts and where we place our trust. Giving to God trains our hearts to trust Him and live for His kingdom.

Why did God reject Cain and his offering but regard Abel and His offering?

- Hebrews 11:4
 - o Abel's offering was given in faith.
 - Faith is actively putting confidence and trust in someone or something.

Giving is intended to reveal our object/s of trust and develop our faithful trust in God.

Giving to God in faithful trust is:

- Responding to God's grace (Genesis 3:21; Genesis 3:15; 2 Corinthians 8:1-9; Genesis 4:5b-7)
- Recognition that God is the source of all we have (Genesis 4:4; Proverbs 3:5-10)
- Releasing the resources God has entrusted to you for His kingdom's purposes (Matthew 6:19-24; Matthew 6:33)

Questions for reflection:

- What does my current giving (or lack of) reveal about my heart before God?
- Where am I struggling to trust God most?
- What is my next step in giving regularly to God?
